National Director's Report

Greetings Monaco International members. Sheri and I attended FMCA's 105th International Convention and RV Expo in Lincoln, Nebraska this past August. While there, I had the privilege to attend the Governing Board meeting as your new National Director. Several changes occurred at this meeting: Article XVII chapter 5 of the standing rules was modified; ways to increase membership was discussed; the benefits of FMC Assist; and changes to Tech Connect+.

Due to the difficulty some Chapters are having with filling officer positions, Article XVII - Chapter 5 of the standing rules was modified to remove the mandatory 2nd vice president and alternate national director positions. A chapter can now have a minimum of three (3) officers. The revised chapter is listed below:

Article XVII - Chapter (5): A chapter will elect a president, one or more vice presidents, a secretary, a treasurer, and a national director for a one- or two-year term. An associate chapter will elect a president, one or more vice presidents, a secretary, and a treasurer for a one-year or two-year term. A chapter may elect in their bylaws to combine the positions of secretary and treasurer into a single position. A chapter has the option of whether to elect an alternate national director. However, a chapter other than associate, must maintain at least three (3) members holding the officer positions in that chapter. An FMCA member may hold no more than two chapter offices simultaneously. A member may hold an office in two chapters, however he/she may not hold the offices of national director or alternate national director in more than one chapter.

FMCA membership numbers have dropped 257 members in the first seven months of 2022. The Long Range planning committee had several explanations for this drop, high fuel cost, the average age of members being 72 years of age, people are not aware that all RV's are welcome at FMCA, and other reasons. FMCA has created a Recruitment committee to focus on recruiting younger members and advertisement, and is giving current members a \$10 gift card for inviting new members. The bottom line, "word of mouth" is the best way to increase membership. So, please tell others about FMCA and the benefits membership provides.

Speaking of benefits, FMC Assist is a great benefit which is included with your annual membership. FMC Assist is emergency medical evacuation and repatriation coverage available to active FMCA members who experience a medical event and are no longer able to continue their travels. FMCA members must be 75 or more miles from home to qualify. Full-time RVers are always considered 75 or more miles from home. FMC Assist services are also available to members when traveling abroad. This benefit is underwritten by CHUBB and is approximately 15% of FMCA's budget. See FMCA's website for all benefits available to members.

Due to IRS rules, FMCA was in danger of losing their non-profit status because of the Tech Connect+ program. This caused FMCA to move Tech Connect+ into Family Motor Coaching Inc. This is the for-profit division of FMCA. Of course, the move caused T-Mobile to stop supporting Tech Connect+ and Tech Connect+ had to change to AT&T, which increased the cost. However, for unlimited data \$59.99 per month is a great price.

“International RV'ing!”

This summer Louise and I are repeating an exploration of RV'ing in other parts of the world. In 2014, we scheduled a cruise from Fiji around the South Pacific islands. Since we would be flying that far anyway, why just do a two-week cruise? Why not make it worthwhile? We reserved a camper for one month in New Zealand and three months in Australia. This whole trip was an adventure. Neither of us had been to either country, or any of the Pacific Islands— we would tour on the cruise.

We had such a wonderful time camping our way around New Zealand and Australia that we decided to do the same this summer. We have a two-week cruise scheduled on the Adriatic Sea and will be exploring the coast of Italy, Croatia and Montenegro as this newsletter is posted. Neither of us had been to Italy so we rented a camper van and have now been on the road for just over a month. As I write this we are camped on the shores of Lake Garda, Italy's largest lake.

The camper was rented in Venice which is where our Cruise originates. It is a 6-meter-long van with a tiny two burner gas stove and a minuscule kitchen sink. Reminiscent of our first motor home, a used 1994 Dynasty with no slides, there can be only one person moving around at a time in the camper van. Louise does a wonderful job coping with the kitchen facilities. We use the campground restroom facilities.

To say this trip has been an adventure is an understatement. Neither of us knows much Italian and have been depending "on the kindness of strangers" to take a phrase from one of Louise's favorite plays, A Streetcar Named Desire. Fortunately, we are finding that in the travel industry, English is a standard second language. Still, maps, train and bus schedules, signage and other information is sometimes only printed in Italian. Funny side note, many of my advertisements on my internet home page are now in Italian.

Language has been the least of our problems. Those who have been to Europe know that the roads here are not near American standards. It is what drove Dwight Eisenhower to propose and with the help of Congress, enact the Interstate Highway Program for the US.

Roads here are narrower but most important, they are seldom straight. Italy has the Autostrada which is very similar to our interstate highways with the exception that tolls apply any time you are on the Autostrada. They seem to be about 10 cents a mile, and yes, I'm using miles. I have tried to set my GPS to kilometers but finally gave up and just use miles. The GPS does do the conversion from kilometers per hour to miles per hour so at least I have that information.

Having curving roads, roundabouts, and a network of roads that reminds me of a spider web, we have found ourselves frequently lost. That applies to walking in cities as well as driving. We have even ended up on trains going in the wrong direction. It has reached the point where it is a joke with us. As the train from Rome toward our campground headed out of town, we quickly realized that we were deep into farm country. Louise burst into laughter, lost again.

We have created some wonderful memories and when the irritation of some travel difficulties fade from our memories, easy to do at our age, we will long remember all the wonderful experiences. We have swum in the Adriatic Sea, the Mediterranean Sea and now Lake Garda. We have toured some amazing cathedrals including St. Peters Basilica in Rome and the Duomo (central cathedral in a city) in Milan, second largest in the world and an amazing exhibit of Gothic and Renaissance architecture. The number of statues and quantity of other carved art on the exterior alone is simply awesome. We have seen Notre Dame in Paris and there is no comparison.

South of Venice in the small town of Fano, we stumbled on an ancient Roman wall complete with an impressive arched gate. Not mentioned in any guidebook this structure, more than a mile long, was built in the first century of the modern era, started in 9 AD.

We traveled as far south as Salerno where we took a ferry tour of the Amalfi Coast, famous for it's rugged landscape. There are two towns, Sorrento and Positano, characterized by buildings clinging to the cliffs, and movie quality road system (think James Bond). We climbed to the summit of Mt. Vesuvius and looked into the bottom of the crater. We toured Pompeii, the city buried under ash from Mt. Vesuvius.

Rome, Pizza, Florence, Milan, Verona are now more than just names in a book, we have rich personal experiences in each one. Opening night at the opera in an outdoor coliseum in Verona was amazing for Tom and a lifetime experience for Louise. It was the first opera in two years in Verona due to COVID closures and they chose Carmen as their first production.

Would we do it again? Would we recommend it for others? At 75 years old, I think we have put a period at the end of our experiences traveling in RV's in foreign countries. We still want to see much of Europe but that will be done with river cruises or other tours. Not our preferred travel but sometimes you just have to accept limits. For those younger or more adventuresome, there is no better way to go. We have found RV parks available without reservation. We even got a beachfront campsite at Camping Salerno, just a few steps from our camper to the Mediterranean Sea. The sound of the waves lulled us to sleep each night. Shower and toilet facilities have been very clean and up to American standards. Campgrounds are rough by American standards (think gravel, dirt, sometimes grass, seldom level) but people are friendly everywhere. Camp on!

I finally offered to be a Rally Master, and it was a great experience, a few sleepless nights notwithstanding. Bob and Jane White agreed to be the Registrars and Norma Preston was Rally Treasurer. The Voyager's staff guided the coaches to their parking spots, but our greeters handed out welcome bags and value packs and checked the attendees in.

We started with 40 sites, which were filled quickly. We ended up with 37 coaches after a few cancellations. Over half participated in the caravan to FMCA.

About half the attendees took advantage of our 3 early-arrival days to settle in and visit or tour. We had a card bingo afternoon on the 16th and had drawings for cash door prizes.

The Rally officially kicked off on the 17th with a Welcome Social. Our caterer, Fat Willy's (the Voyager's onsite restaurant) received great reviews for their food, which ranged from meatloaf to stir-fry to prime rib dinner entrees. They were also our bartenders, because they own the liquor license for our meeting room. Attendees seemed OK with the 2 drink tickets each that were included in their value packs for the Welcome Social and 3 Dinners.

We found our entertainers from local AZ talent. All were versed in golden oldies, classic country, rock-and-roll, and rhythm & blues tunes. The dance floor had a workout, especially when the Electric Slide crowd jumped in.

Norma Preston generously created a beautiful quilt for us to raffle off, with proceeds going to the local La Casa de Los Ninos charity for at-risk children in the Tucson area. (Louise Butler had the lucky ticket.) Attendees bought all our table decorations, too, with proceeds going to Los Ninos.
